Welcome to our review of 2025, a transformational year for this much-loved park.

2025 marked 171 years since the opening of this internationally significant and historic landscape, originally created as the new, permanent home to the architectural marvel, the Crystal Palace, in 1854.

It was also the 2nd anniversary of Crystal Palace Park Trust's new custodianship of this Grade II* Registered Park and Garden and its many unique attractions and venues, via a 125-year lease from the London Borough of Bromley.

This remit brings much responsibility and we were delighted that after decades of community campaigning, detailed design work, planning and fundraising the major regeneration and restoration works being co-delivered with Bromley Council started right on schedule in May.

We can't wait to re-open all areas of the park when the works complete in summer 2026 and thank all our visitors, volunteers, partners and donors for the patience with path closures, team work on delivery, and financial backing to realise long-held ambitions to save this special place.

But, for now, we're delighted to share the highlights from the last 12 months in this Year in Review. We hope you enjoy.

1 AWARD

for Restoration Project of the Year

Crystal Palace Park Trust, London Borough of Bromley and the Friends of Crystal Palace Subway were awarded a prestigious Museums+Heritage Award for 'Restoration Project of the Year' for the Grade II* Subway.

After re-opening in 2024, 8,055 people visited this hidden gem via an Open Day in the 160th year since it originally opened in 1865.

The park's major regeneration plan and restoration projects, are being co-delivered by Bromley Council and the Trust, which will both secure the major assets on Heritage At Risk Register for the enjoyment of generations to come, and ensure the park is welcoming, safe and accessible for all visitors.

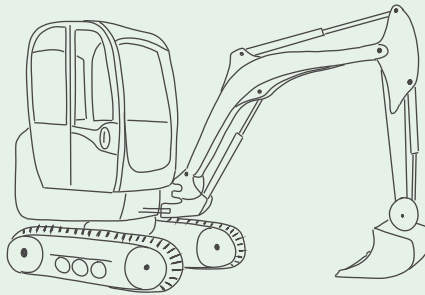

After standing for over 170 years, the Grade II Italian Terraces are on Historic England's At Risk Register and there was an urgent need to restore them.

The works are restoring the stonework across all walls, balustrades and steps, as well as improving below ground drainage to help prevent further structural damage to the Italian Terraces.

Step-free access is also being introduced across the Italian Terraces.

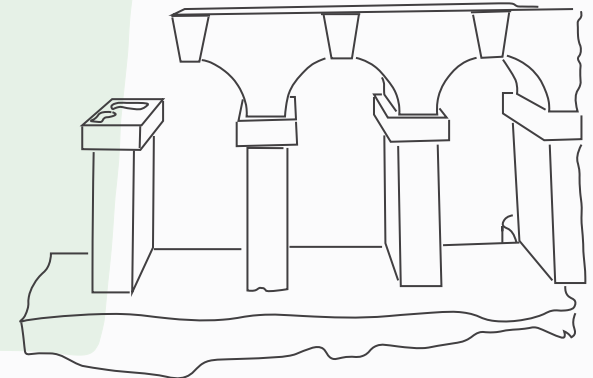

Protecting the park's heritage

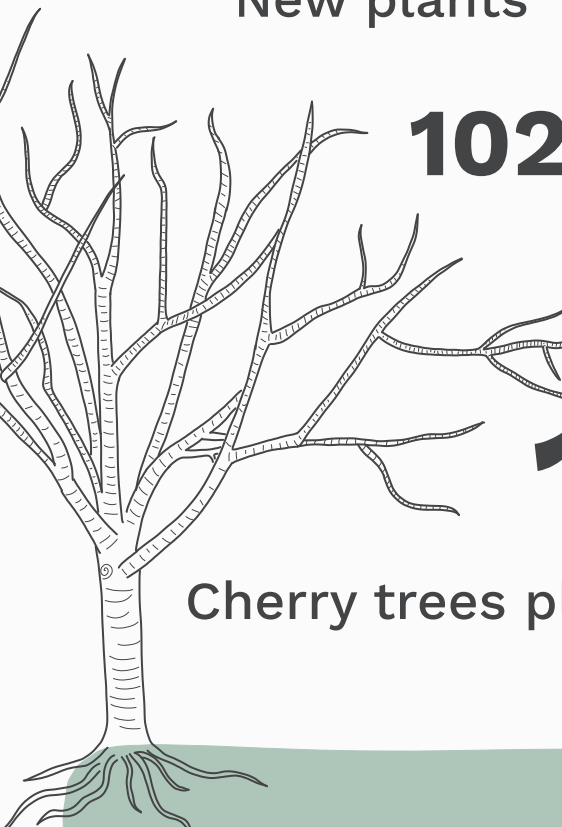


Caring for nature & the environment

Alongside caring for the park's heritage landmarks, we are increasing our efforts to support its natural environment through the work of gardening staff and dedicated volunteers. Hands-on planting, habitat improvements and ongoing maintenance are enhancing biodiversity across the park, from new native hedging and bulbs to thousands of new plants, helping Crystal Palace Park to thrive for both people and wildlife.

Keeping the park clean & tidy



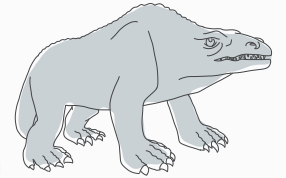

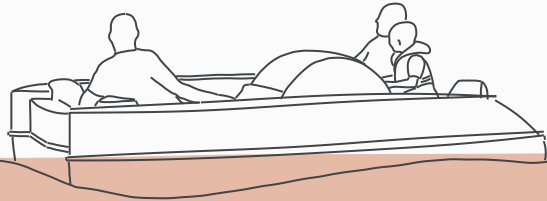

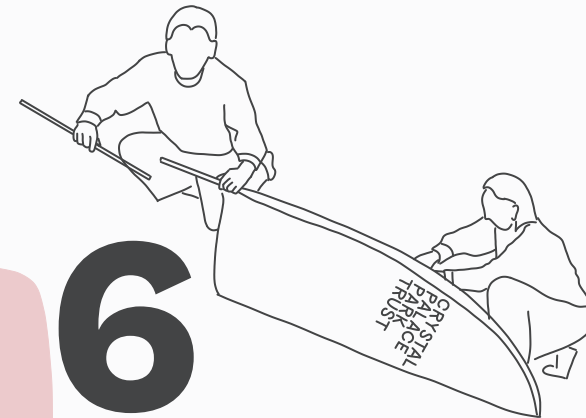
We also launched new Advisory Groups created in 2025 to elevate key voices through the Young Advisory Group and the Access Advisory Group with 15 total members.

Crystal Palace Park is a large and complex park to care for due to its unique heritage. We spend over £2 million every year keeping the park clean, safe and welcoming for over 1 million visits every year.

As a Registered Charity the Trust raises this money through a wide range of income sources including festivals, events, filming, tenants, concessions, grant funding and car parking charges.

In addition, the capital regeneration plan and restoration projects being co-delivered by Bromley Council and the Trust need additional funding.

In 2025 a **£21.8m**
programme of regeneration works
started on the 19th of May.
